Don Bosco College owes its existence to Rev. Fr Francis Guezou of happy memory, the Founding Director of Don Bosco Centre. He envisioned a quality higher education institute for the most deserving rural and target youth, not merely to give a degree but make them employable. BICS InfoTech was established in 1998 focusing only on computer education and it

was elevated as Don Bosco College, affiliated to Thiruvalluvar University as a self-financing institution in the year 2012.

Today the college has 1005 students, out of which 85% are first-generation learners and nearly parents of 75% of them are daily wage labourers. b. Best Performance Awards

The Best Performance Award instituted in the previous year is reinforced with an out-going boy and an out-going girl from each Class (irrespective of the sections in a Department) with a Certificate of Merit and a Citation. The criteria for selection of students are Academic Performance, Attitude, Leadership qualities, community service, discipline, improvement in communicative English, achievements etc.

Similarly, the best performance award is instituted for the academic associations and youth clubs. This is to motivate the student body to involve actively in extra-curricular and extension activities which is required for their holistic formation.

c. Teaching-Learning Process

Apart from traditional lecture method, the other methods of learning experience provided to the students include seminars, debates, training programmes, projects, T.V. programmes, LCD, VCD, Lingua phone, Internet, Group Discussion, Power Point Presentation, Problem-based, Inquiry-based, and Activities-based Learning etc. Weekly I.T.Association activities. Assignments, additional lab hours and paper presentation programmes make the learning

student-centered. Learning management system using MOODLE is made as the de facto platform to course management.

d. Professional Education

To bridge the gap between the industry expectations and the knowledge imparted as curriculum in colleges, and to enable our students to be technically skilled, we at DBCY offer a special education called Professional Education to all the second and third year students of all departments. The second batch of students [2013 batch] passed out successfully and the certificates were printed and distributed to all students. It is noteworthy to see many candidates being appointed as Software and other professionals in IT and IT-enabled industries and this is done even before the publication of UG results.

C. Student Support and Progression

a. Mentoring activity

- **Mentoring activity** is becoming increasingly important in higher education. Mentoring helps students work smarter, develops key talent, aids personal planning, avoids stress, promotes self-confidence, changes lives and careers. As a professional development tool, mentoring is an effective means of supporting them in their career aspirations.
- Each staff member is assigned with 25 students. They meet every week on the III Day Order. The Mentor has one-one interface meeting with the Mentee, builds trust and confidence, listens to the needs, expectations, aspirations and problems, holds discussion, provides advice and guidance. He then helps them set realistic expectations, create a solid plan of action, and make decisions for achieving their goals. Absolute respect for privacy, honesty and integrity is maintained. Progress made are ascertained in the subsequent meeting and follow up actions are assigned

b. Class Quality Circles

Class Quality Circles have been formed for each class to facilitate learning and to bring about positive changes in teaching-learning process. CQC is a voluntary forum to inculcate habit of working in groups, finding ways for improvement of class room activities, identifying the needs, understanding problems amongst themselves and creating strategies to solve problems. Students are highly motivated and enthusiastic to bring about novelty in cleanliness, discipline, language

rule, self-learning, punctuality, dress code. Periodic meetings are conducted and decisions are made by open discussion and consensus. It is heartening to note that CQC is helping the classmates to improve their vocabulary, to observe language rule, to be punctual, to update their general knowledge, to be aware of the burning issues of our country.

c. Career Guidance and Placements

The College signed an MoU on 1st September 2016 with Quest Alliance (Bangalore-based NGO for youth empowerment) through Don Bosco Vazhikaatti, Chennai. The objectives are:

- To introduce final year students to the wide array of occupations, including new jobs created in this ever-changing world-of-work.
- To deepen students' understanding of self and different career pathways.
- To enable students to gather information from various sources to make them aware of educational and career decisions, to learn how to: Clarify their career self-concept, develop Employability skills and Soft skills

MyQuest, an employability and skill development programme is conducted for all final year students (273 in number) with two dedicated staff members.

d. Student Empowerment

Apart from the regular five hours of the curriculum, two hours are set aside daily for the holistic development of the students. Special emphasis is given to technological advancement, language fluency, leadership training, team work and confidence building through Youth Clubs, Association activities and Market-ready courses. These initiatives are geared to provide adequate expertise and exposure to the students ensuring an institute-industry interface.

e. Scholarship Schemes

As a policy, we ensure that no student, who has come under our care, is deprived of education on account of poverty. We spare no efforts to tap resources available for scholarship. The Management supplements the scholarship by way of service scholarship. The services demanded of them to merit the scholarship add to the dignity of labour and character formation more than the case award.
